PREZ SPEAKS

Our ARRL Southwestern Division Director, Richard Norton N6AA, and Assistant Orange Section Manager, Richard Thompson WA6NOL, provided an interesting program at our August meeting on their activities to support Ham Radio within the official framework of the ARRL. Director Norton also offered a special deal on ARRL membership and Richard Thompson described in detail exactly what are the Section Manager duties and responsibilities. If you missed this meeting, you missed a lot of good information.

Our September meeting will feature a presentation by Bill Scholz W1HIJ, one of the friendly faces at our local Ham Radio Outlet store. Bill is active in the Coast Guard Auxiliary and will talk about the Guard's activities in the current stream of hurricanes in the Gulf of Mexico and on the east coast. Bill was first licensed in 1954 and remains active in emergency communications and on CW. As I grew up in Galveston, Texas, I recall many hurricanes and how our local Coast Guard provided assistance through those storms. The library has been closed for over a month for repairs, which are not complete even yet. The ceiling support structure was destroyed and many tiles and light fixtures

fell during the quake; pictures shown on the library website are dramatic. Cell phone and even land line traffic was interrupted over a wide local area for over an hour even from this moderate quake. Keep your ham radio emergency equipment ready!

Bonelli Park ARDF September 20

Our next southern California on-foot radio foxhunting session will be Saturday, September 20 at Bonelli Regional Park in eastern Los Angeles County. It will be a special "welcome home" session for ARDF Team USA, which participated in the World ARDF Championships near Seoul, Korea during the first week of September. George Neal KF6YKN was bronze medal winner on two meters in the M50 category these at championships.

This event will feature transmitters on two meters for both beginners and experts. A ham radio license and knowledge of radio equipment are not required. Experts will be on hand to teach the basic techniques of on-foot radio direction-finding (RDF). An optional 80-meter fox transmitter will also be on the air.

Transmitter hunting begins at 10 AM. You may start the courses at any time up until 1 PM. All courses close at 3 PM. There are picnic tables and BBQ grills nearby, so you can bring your lunch or cook up something if you wish.

The beginner course and the 80-meter transmitter hunt will be free of charge. The advanced ARDF training will use electronic registration/scoring ("e-punch") so a \$5 per entry (individual or group) donation is requested to defray the cost of the full-color orienteering map and e-punch equipment.

Trails are primitive in some areas of the park, so wear sturdy shoes. All ages are welcome, but young children must be accompanied by an adult at all times.

Bonelli Regional Park is near Raging Waters, Brackett Field, and Puddingstone Reservoir. From the 57/210 freeways, take the Via Verde exit and go east through the entrance

to the park. There is a per-vehicle entry fee. Go approximately 1/4 mile beyond the entrance and turn left into the parking lot for the bike rental stand. Look for the orange-and-white orienteering flag directing you to the starting site. A map to the site is at <www.homingin.com>.

If you have them, bring a handi-talkie, receiver, or scanner covering the twometer band for each person who will be going ARDFing. If you have directional antennas, attenuators, or other on-foot RDF equipment, be sure to bring it too. Make sure all batteries are fresh. For those with no radio some extra ARDF sets will receiver/antenna be available. Also, be sure to bring anything you'll need while going after those radio foxes, such as munchies, bottled water and sunscreen. For map plotting, bring your own compass, protractor and pencil.

HDSCS News

August was a busy month for HDSCS members even though there were no emergency callouts. First of all it was "Termite Month" That's when we encourage members to be in the "woodwork" as much as possible and respond when called: talk to each hospital other: answer group questions, all to earn points and try to get into the Top Tier of Termites. It's a great way for members to learn call signs and match them with names and voices. That really makes nets go more smoothly and certainly when in an emergency we function better.

Also in August we finished up our summer field trips to UCI Medical Center. With the guidance of a clinical

supervisor from the Trauma Center we toured the emergency department and trauma center; the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit; the burn ICU; the neuroscience ICU; the surgical ICU; the medical ICU and listened in on paramedic calls to the paramedic base station. The value of these special tours was to familiarize members with critical patient care area to better understand the kind of messages they might handle in a communications emergency and to increase our comfort level for being in those areas. The tours were terrific and we will continue those for our members in the fall.

The month ended with 22 HDSCS communicators supporting the St. Joseph medical personnel as they provided medical care to the runners in the Disneyland Half Marathon. Approximately 13.500 runners participated in this event that started at 6AM on August 31. HDSCS members provided communications at command center inside Disnevland's Central First Aid: medical aid stations along the route, the finish line; the main medical tent; and the reunion tent. Our members also shadowed key St. Joseph and rode along as communicators for the medical bicycle teams. While we didn't have the high heat and humidity that existed last year it was still warm enough to cause numerous runners to suffer from heat exhaustion and other heat related problems. The HDSCS network provided quick communications to get assistance to runners and were also invaluable in provided information to all key locations at once.

Now the fall looms with training meetings and drills. We'll update you all further in a next newsletter.


