How Much RF is Too Much? A Look at Low-Level Radio Frequency (RF) Exposure and Current Science

If your club members haven't yet been denied a permit for an antenna tower, it is just a matter of time. And one of the arguments opponents bring up is that RF causes cancer or other diseases. Major health authorities recognize that extremely high RF fields can cause over-heating and tissue damage, but there is much misunderstanding about low-level exposure. A great deal of quality research has been completed on RF and microwave exposure in recent years, and the literature health effects numerous times. At this point, public health agencies of leading nations agree that no convincing evidence emerged has

showing health hazards from low-intensity RF or microwaves.

But not all agree. Some parents' groups have campaigned against the use of wireless internet in schools, homeowners' associations have opposed cellphone towers, and special interest groups have launched local crusades against wireless (smart) utility meters and amateur radio stations.

This talk provides high quality information on recent findings from major public health authorities and government agencies with international standing. It also looks at the opposing opinions and identifies some of the key players. All attendees will receive a list of recent health agency statements on RF and microwave exposure.

With over 18 years in public health communications. Brian Thorson is a three-time award winner for contributions to EMF and wireless fields research projects. Brian received his First-Class commercial FCC license in 1979 and his Extra-Class Amateur radio license in 2008. He is active on Amateur 10 GHz and operates on the HF, 2m, 220 and 440 MHz bands. He serves as V.P. of the San Bernardino Microwave Society.

Updated convention transmitter hunt info

Two Ways to Hunt Hidden Transmitters at HamCon 2015.

The Fullerton Radio Club is presenting two opportunities to win prizes while doing radio direction finding during Hamcon 2015.

On Friday evening 9/11, there will be a mobile (vehicle) T-hunt starting promptly at 7 PM from the large parking lot at the north side of the Torrance Marriott, 3635 Fashion Way, Torrance, California. This is a timed hunt on 146.565 MHz. The first team to find the transmitter wins the top prize. At least one team member must be registered for the convention to be eligible for prizes. These official teams must check in with the Fullerton Radio Club representative in the parking lot before the hunt starts. Unofficial teams are welcome but will not be under consideration for prizes. There will be talk-in on 146.565 MHz for last minute confirmation of the exact start point.

Then on Sunday 9/13, there will be an all-on-foot two-meter transmitter hunting session at Angel's Gate Park in San Pedro, co-sponsored by the Fort MacArthur Military Museum. A ham radio license is

not required and there is no age limit. You can hunt as an individual or in a team of two. Only one set of RDF equipment is allowed per team.

This on-foot hunt is intended to be a suitable challenge to both beginner and experienced transmitter hunters. There will be prizes for the best hunters, but only convention badge holders are eligible to win them. Bring your receivers, scanners, directional antennas, attenuators, and other equipment suitable for on-foot RDF. If you don't have RDF equipment, plan to attend the workshop for building two-meter measuring-tape yagis and offset attenuators that will take place just before the Sunday transmitter hunt.
